Reflection

The church faces real challenges as it seeks to sustain its life and work in this generation. It is said that more have shown an interest in Faith matters since churches have been closed but will that translate in to more church attendees? I suspect not; but does that matter?

But if the question that Jesus posed to disciples is asked of us, what would we say? Jesus asks 'Who am I? What do I mean to you?' Believing in Jesus as your Lord and Saviour does it make a difference to the way you worship and live? This is a question we need to answer,

for if we answer without conviction we as the body of so called believers will fail in our influence to create God's kingdom here on earth.

So, are we in a position to defend our faith?

----Who is this Jesus who we are worshipping today?

Many Jews of Jesus day (and still today) believe that God would send them an anointed King who would spearhead a movement that would free Israel from oppression and bring justice and peace to their world. No-one knew when this King would be born although the prophet Micah indicated he would be born in Bethlehem. Many saw this Messiah as a warrior King who would defeat the pagan hordes and establish Israel's freedom and bring God's kingdom here on earth. No-one knew what this might look like. There were several in the first century who claimed to be the Messiah, but they were often caught by the authorities and their followers disbanded. To be known as a Messiah courted trouble.

When Jesus put the question to his disciples—'Who do men say that I am?'-- he chose Caesarea Philippi in the northern part of Israel. Caesarea Philippi was a cosmopolitan city rebuilt by Herod's son Philip, tetrarch of this region at this time and it contained a shrine to the Greek god Pan. The region was settled by Hellenised Syrian Gentiles and there were many ideas about religions and rulers.

It was here away from the mainstream Jewish people, well away from his usual sphere of activity that Jesus asked his question. The disciples reported the general reaction to Jesus— John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah or one of the prophets. Not a cosy comforting fellow, but like the wild prophets of recent or ancient times, who stood up and spoke God's word fearlessly, a mouth piece against wickedness and injustice in high places. But within that prophetic ministry lay another dimension and Jesus wanted to know if his disciples had grasped that dimension. He was not just God's mouth piece, he was God's Messiah. So he asked them 'Who do you say that I am?' and clearly Simon Peter at least had grasped the facts—'You are the Messiah, Son of the living God'. What Simon Peter was saying was, 'you are the true King. You are the one Israel has been waiting for'. Simon Peter had recognised Jesus particular relationship to God. Peter must have known that to acknowledge this was risky, but he obviously answered from his heart. He could have said, 'You are a talented speaker and Rabbi, you are a Galilean and a carpenter, but he answered 'You are the presence of God, God's salvation to his people' and Jesus responds by blessing him and telling him that this truth was given to him by God, and he re-enforces Peter's name by calling him 'the Rock on which he will build his church'. Simon Peter himself was to be the foundation for his new building. Just as God gave Abram a new name Abraham indicating that he would be father to many nations, so Jesus gives Simon a new name –Peter, Petra, the Rock. The movement to build a community consisting of all those who give allegiance to Jesus as God's appointed king began there in Caesarea Philippi.

Peter's declaration of faith was the starting point of the church. But it is interesting that it is only in Matthew's gospel that Jesus talks about a 'church'. Alfred Loisy famously preached that 'Jesus preached the kingdom and it was the church that came'. Roger Spiller, in his sermon on this gospel passage says, some would argue that if Jesus was expecting the coming of his kingdom in his lifetime, there would be no need of a church. But by the time Matthew wrote his gospel he was convinced of the necessity for the church in the purpose of God. -----But what a bureaucratic collection of denominations has been created!

If Peter is the Rock then the church is comprised of living stones—it isn't a building but a community that gathers round Jesus, not the numbers who belong to one denomination or another but all those that faithfully witness to the world that Jesus is the bond that joins humanity to God for ever, and gives meaning to life and existence and to the one who has died to show us God's unfathomable love for humankind.

The church today is a testimony to Peter's faith. It exists because Peter and others like him trusted and believed in God's Messiah, despite the circumstances around them, despite the hostility of the religious leaders of the time, despite the persecutions unleashed on them by the Romans, despite the lions unleashed in the Coliseum, and the roadside crucifixions--- All that from Peter's confession of faith.

We are here this morning too because of Peter's expression of faith >2000 years ago. Many of us wonder what it is going to take to make our church grow again. What is it that we need to be doing? What new service shall we offer, what new programmes do we need to start?

But God wants the same of us as he did of those first disciples. He wants us to recognise who Jesus is. We can't like Peter physically walk along side him—even if we could, we might not recognise him. We rely on the Holy Spirit to make him known to us, to reveal his Lordship, to allow us a close relationship. Not because if we have to 'turn or burn' as the old saying goes—come to Jesus or spend eternity in hell. Even John Wesley was once quoted as saying, 'you might be able to scare people into coming to church, but you won't keep them there'. Jesus calls us to choose light rather than darkness, and his call to us is because of his extraordinary love for us that even death is no match for

Jesus wants us to know him, to love him, to allow him to love us back that we might share our relationship with him with others.

Jesus asks us to live his question---to make him our Messiah. And as Paul says to the church in Rome—'Let us be transformed by the renewing of our minds to find what is God's will is for us'. And as we all have different gifts let us work together to bring in God's kingdom on earth and overcome evil with good in the strength of His love. Let us be the living stones of the Jesus church meeting within or without walls. It is then by our actions and not our words as we try to live his love for the world that the church might grow until all come to know him.

Prayers for forgiveness

Lord you have given us so much, Yet we give you so very little in return. There are times when we make enthusiastic promises; But you know how they fade. We confess that our words, thoughts and actions often deny our faith in you, Yet you continue to love us and forgive us. Help us to turn our commitments into reality; matched to the people we are, May we be living stones to witness to your love And may our lives reflect your sacrifice for us. **Amen**
