Reflections

The Gospel reading from last Sunday told us that the disciples understood who Jesus was; at least for a moment. Interrogated by Jesus about the wider public's perception of his identity, the disciples said that Jesus was a prophet; and then later that he was more than a prophet too. They saw in him the anointed one of God, the one gifted with God's power, a power Jesus was then willing to turn over to his followers. We can only imagine the excitement when Jesus said: Whatever you bind is bound. Whatever you loosen is loosened'. This is incredible power; and this incredible power was being placed in disciples' hands. They felt that with that power, they could reshape the world. They must have been dazzled by the fact that theirs would be the generation that would bear witness to the fulfilment of so many of God's promises. They were convinced that God's anointed one would respond in a way that would transform the world and set things right. There was excitement that nothing would ever be the same from that moment forward. They felt the world was shifting under their feet.

Unfortunately, that sense of excitement was short-lived; they soon discovered that although the world was shifting, this was happening in a way they hadn't expected. The disciples quickly learnt that it wasn't enough to know who Jesus was; or to dream of a world transformed. Dreaming of that new world would require that their imaginations expand beyond their excitement about the power and influence they thought were within their grasp. "From that time on," Jesus started to explain that the Messiah would not be embraced but rejected, not crowned but executed, not empowered by might but weakened by affliction. What a disappointment this must have been? What a baffling shift in expectations? Clearly, this was not what Peter had imagined when he dared to speak the truth about Jesus' identity. He spoke correctly though incompletely, for Peter began to seek to correct the Messiah about the nature and scope of his mission. I can imagine Peter's internal world falling apart. I can hear his words saying to Jesus: 'Listen, Jesus, this cannot be what God intends for you. There must be a different way. This is not what our deliverer ought to do. Suffering and dying is what we have all endured, prophet and ordinary person alike. You are supposed to be different. You are supposed to save us from all our enemies!'

Jesus' reproach was anything but subtle: "Get behind me, Satan!" In a matter of minutes Peter fell from the heights of recognition to the depths of rejection. Because Peter cannot imagine himself going into that direction, he tried to persuade Jesus not to go down that road either. In that way he was acting like the great deceiver: precisely because Peter is drawing Jesus away from the divinely ordained path that moves from suffering to the cross, from torture to shame.

This must have been a very painful moment for Peter; discovering that not only the way of suffering is the way of Jesus, but also that this was going to be his path and the path of all future generations of Jesus followers. The disciples were not just witnesses of Jesus' suffering but participants in it. They were called not just to talk about it; but to live it in their own bodies. That was what following Jesus looked like; it was a path that was lined with crosses and paved with suffering modelled on Jesus' passion. It was a matter of life and death for his followers as much as it was for Jesus.

Jesus concluded the conversation by reassuring them that suffering will not be the end; that the heavy and painful cross wouldn't be the end; but that Jesus would return and bring justice in his wake. Such justice is not merely the paying off of old debts or the settling of bitter scores. Instead, this judgment is a promise of deliverance from suffering and all that is wrong in our world. It is the promise of a new world and a new future in which justice blooms, a future in which the hungry are fed and the imprisoned are comforted as we read in Matthew 25:31-46.

We find ourselves in the same situation as these disciples who thought that following Jesus would give a short cut to heaven; to a new world that is free from suffering, challenges and illnesses. Jesus tells us as he told them then, that suffering and persecution and disapproving stares are part of what it is to follow Jesus. In fact, the kingdom is not something that will come at the end of everything, it breaks through our lives in great and small ways. This is what drives us into a hopeful future even when our present troubles are engulfing us. After all, Jesus walked this path before us. Jesus knew too well rejection and loathing. He has gone before us. Now, we will follow him in faith. The world we are called to be disciples is this one, we cannot speak to it with honesty and integrity without opposition which sometimes can cost us friends and family members.

In conclusion being able to follow Jesus requires us to move into the reality of what discipleship entails. Confessing that Jesus is the Messiah is only one step. Saying the words "Jesus is the Messiah" requires us to live a life that knows suffering and pain. This kind of life has a future and hope in the coming of the Lord, the one who was, is and will always be. **Amen**
