#### REFLECTION

May the words of my mouth and the meditations of all our hearts be acceptable to you Lord, our strength and our salvation. Amen.

I am eternally captivated by the power of words. I have a Facebook friend who regularly posts little bits of humour, often word play. These words have the power to make me laugh which is extremely helpful these days. I am able to have video calls with my grandchildren and their words have the power to warm my heart. The words of the Bible have the power to comfort or to challenge me.

A former colleague of mine recently said that Isaiah 40 is one of his favourite chapters in the Bible. It begins with the words: 'Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God.' and ends with the assurance that 'those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.' Comforting words indeed. An assurance much needed when our strength is at a low point, we feel workshall down and upable to walk much loss fly and we are indeed. weighed down and unable to walk much less fly, and we are indeed very, very weary. Isaiah offers us words of comfort in a very challenging time.

Last week I listened to The Reverend Canon Dr. Jennifer Smith of Wesley's Chapel in London preach on the passage immediately preceding today's reading from Mark's gospel. Jen told us that Mark was her favourite gospel...if we are allowed to have a favourite. She spoke of the energy and speed that fuel Mark's telling of Jesus' 'holy human story.' I had to smile because I had a supernumerary minister

in one of my churches in Hastings who was also passionate about Mark. We had very good natured debates about Mark and Luke. You see I can get pretty passionate about Luke. Give me his storytelling, his insight into human nature and his slower, steady pace any day. The speed with which Mark tells the story wears me out. Did you know that the word immediately is used 27 times in the 16 chapters of Mark's gospel? That compares to 26 times in the 73 chapters of Matthew, Luke and John combined. Jen convinced me...with probably a little help from my supernumerary friend...that I needed to pay attention to Mark's intensity and carefully chosen words.

The passage from Mark's gospel is complex. Seemingly unconnected events happen in quick succession. It is early days in Jesus' ministry. He has just called Simon and Andrew, James and John. It is the Sabbath and Jesus and the four disciples go to the synagogue in Capernaum. As Jesus is teaching he is interrupted by a man with an unclean spirit. Jesus stops what he is doing and heals the man. Those present are left wondering: 'What is this? A new teaching – with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits and they obey him.' 'As soon as' they leave the synagogue they go to the house of Simon and Andrew. In the space of two short verses Jesus is told that Simon's mother-in-law is ill, he touches her, the fever leaves her and she begins to serve them. It is a very compact healing story. The immediacy of healing is evident in her ability to serve them. Her response to Jesus' touch is to serve him. In his carefully chosen words Mark is telling us that our response to Jesus' touch in our lives is to serve. In a sense Jesus called Simon's mother-in-law into discipleship with that touch...just as he had called the fishermen a few verses earlier.

Simon's mother-in-law is healed in the presence of only a few but paired with the healing at the synagogue in the presence of many – the news is out – as soon as sundown comes and the Sabbath is over the 'whole city' gathers outside the door. Many come to be healed. The need was great. Jesus responded to that need.

The third part of the passage is difficult. It is not hard to accept that Jesus rose early, sought solitude and prayed. It is easy to see why everyone came looking for him considering the events of the previous day. But we need to understand why Jesus' response to Simon is to move on to the neighbouring towns. Jesus had no interest in becoming the local healer in Capernaum. He did not seek to draw attention to himself. I believe his prayerful response to Simon is a reflection of his intention to do his Father's will. He was to proclaim to all the good news of God's all-embracing love. It was not a mission that could be achieved standing still in one place. The healings were not an end in themselves but part of the proclamation of the **CHURCH COUNCIL.** There will be a Zoom Meeting of Church Council on Monday, 8 February at 7.00pm. Details will be sent out at a later stage to members of Council. However, all church members are welcome to join us since our business is relevant to all and we welcome everyone's views. In the last months, a Strategic Planning Group has been meeting to consider honestly and radically the options for our church in the future: that group's report is to be examined and discussed at our Church Council Meeting. Members wishing to participate in the discussion should contact me in advance, so that I can send you the relevant link.

Another item of business at the February meeting is to confirm post holders for another year. Generally, members simply inform me if they are **unable** to continue in post. presence of God...the God of creation, the God that the prophet Isaiah speaks of with such passion...the God who 'sits above the circle of the earth'...the God who loves us as the unique individuals we are and 'renews our strength' giving us 'wings like eagles.'

Each night as we watch the news about the efforts to tackle the spread of the corona virus, the pressures on the NHS, the frustrations of key workers, the despair of those who have lost their livelihoods. We hear of protests against discrimination and injustice. We learn of coups and unrest. We see pictures of refugees and the plight of the homeless. We might ask, How do we respond to Jesus' touch in our lives? Where is the strength? Where are the wings?

Two and a half weeks ago I sat in front of my television watching what I perceived to be good news as Joe Biden and Kamala Harris were sworn in as President and Vice President. I was full of anticipation and prepared for the unique inauguration that it was to be...or so I thought. My expectations were blown away when a 22 year old black woman stood at the podium to recite a poem she had written for the occasion. I have read Amanda Gorman's poem 'The Hill We Climb' many times and more meaningfully I have watched the video of her performing the poem many times. It is the voice of a prophet for our times. It is a voice that does not shy away from the challenges that face not only my homeland but our world. But it is a voice that sees hope. Let me read just a few passages from that poem in the hope that we might find strength and fly...in the hope that we might find insight into how we respond to Jesus' touch.

'When day comes, we ask ourselves where can we find light in this never-ending shade? The loss we carry, a sea we must wade. We've braved the belly of the beast. We've learned that quiet isn't always peace, and the norms and notions of what 'just is' isn't always justice. And yet, the dawn is ours before we know it. Somehow we do it.'

'We seek harm to none and harmony for all. Let the globe, if nothing else say this is true: That even as we grieved, we grew. That even as we hurt, we hoped. That even as we tired, we tried.'

'When day comes, we step out of the shade, aflame and unafraid. The new dawn blooms as we free it. For there is always light, if only we are brave enough to see it, if only we are brave enough to be it.'

I began by talking about the power of words to give us joy, love, comfort and challenge...and hope. Whether it be in the words of Isaiah, the touch of the Word made flesh or the words of a young contemporary prophet may we find our strength to fly, may we find our strength to be light.
