Some Greeks Wish to See Jesus

²⁰ Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. ²¹ They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' ²² Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. ²³ Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be

glorified. ²⁴ Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. ²⁵ Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. ²⁶ Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.

Jesus Speaks about His Death

²⁷ 'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—"Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸ Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' ²⁹ The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. REFLECTIONS

May the words of my mouth and the meditations of all our hearts be acceptable to you Lord, our strength and our salvation. **Amen.**

Jeremiah is an astonishing book of prophecy written to the people of Israel in exile. The words of Jeremiah 31 in which God approaches his people with comforting words of a new covenant, a new relationship, would have given hope to a people in despair. We speak these words in our annual covenant service to remind us that God unilaterally reached out to the people to restore and reconcile. The Torah, the law, was at the heart of the covenant but rather than something imposed on the people it was to be willingly embraced. It was to be 'written on their hearts.' God set down a covenant of mutuality. 'I will be their God and they will be my people.' The community of faith would *know* God. To *know* God means to have an intimate and trustful relationship, to acknowledge his sovereign authority over all life and to have at the heart of one's being a consistency...a life which in word and deed is in keeping with the will of God. To know God is inclusive and egalitarian. It involves the whole community from the least to the greatest! To *know* God also means to acknowledge that the new relationship has nothing to do

with the actions of the people and everything to do with God's forgiveness. Through the prophet Jeremiah God says: 'I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.' The people would dwell in the heart of God and God would dwell in the hearts of the people.

I remember a television advert in America that challenged the listener 'to be all that could be.' The advert encouraged us to join the US Army for the educational opportunities, the travel, and the experience. I have always remembered that challenge but in a faith context. I have a favourite prayer of confession that I use often. In part it calls us to 'rise to the full height of our humanity.' It calls us 'to be all that we can be in Christ.' As we approach Holy Week we should each prayerfully consider how we can fulfil the purpose for which God created each of us as unique individuals. We should each prayerfully and carefully consider how we can rise to the full height of our humanity and be all he created us to be.

St. John's gospel tells us the story of some Greeks who were in Jerusalem at the time of the Passover. They approach Philip and ask to see Jesus. Philip checks with Andrew and the two go to tell Jesus. The Greeks may be converts to the Jewish faith and choose Philip from among the disciples because of his Greek name. They ask to *see* Jesus. The Greek word used indicates the request is more than curiosity. They want to *see* the one in whom God is revealed. Jesus' response to Philip and Andrew is interesting. He responds to the news saying: 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.' We do not even know if the Greeks did see Jesus or what their response may have been. To Jesus the 'heart of the matter' is that the hour has come.

Today's reading follows the triumphal entry into Jerusalem that we will celebrate next week on Palm Sunday. In verse 19 we read that all the fanfare, all the celebration, all the adulation prompts the Pharisees to say to one another: 'You see you can do nothing. Look, the world has gone after him.' In a sense the Greeks symbolise the world coming to Jesus. Jesus answers Andrew and Philip's message about the Greeks by explaining what it means to *see* him and to follow him. Between the adulation and the plots to kill him, the Greeks come to *see* Jesus. Jesus knows that the moment is at hand when God's plan will be revealed and that, despite his teaching, despite his efforts to prepare the disciples, they will struggle to *see* God's hand in the events as they unfold. The agony of Gethsemane is echoed in verse 27: 'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say – 'Father, save me from this hour?' The hour is the revelation of Jesus' relationship with his Father, the revelation of God's plan of redemption. It is the revelation of what it means to *see* Jesus.

Jesus willingly chose to accept his role in God's plan. As verse 27 continues Jesus answers his own question: "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say – 'Father, save me from this hour?' No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour."

The disciples had a choice to make. We assume the Greek seekers had a choice to make. We have a choice to make. Do we want to **see** Jesus? Will we willingly walk through the days of Holy Week with our eyes wide open? Will we accept our part in God's plan? Will we acknowledge God's covenant relationship with us? Will we **know** God through Jesus? Will we respond accordingly by 'being all we can be.' Will we 'rise to the full height of our humanity.'

Jesus says, 'Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life will lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life.

Whoever serves me must follow me...' Were the disciples willing to follow? Were the Greeks willing to follow? Are we willing to follow?

During Lent we talk of travelling the road to Jerusalem with Jesus. We speak of following in his footsteps. We acknowledge the difficulty of that journey and our inability to do it on our own. When we walk with open eyes, not only during Lent, but each and every day we begin to **see** Jesus, we begin to bear fruit. Then we may rise to the full height of our humanity and be all that we can be.
