All Age Talk

I wonder, how easily you are distracted? Are you someone who can stay focussed, or does your mind often wander off to a different topic or thought?

In the animated film Up, there is a section of the film that involves talking dogs and one of these – called Dug – becomes one of the key characters. However, in the middle of conversations and often when they should be focusing on something else, the dogs in the film will suddenly look away into the distance and shout 'squirrel'! The

presence of a squirrel, or the scent of squirrel, or even the merest hint of a squirrel distracts them, even in the middle of a sentence.

I wonder – are we like that sometimes? Perhaps especially in our Christian lives and as we try to follow Jesus? It is all going along well and then...squirrel!! We look off to the side at the first sign of distraction, and lose our way. Perhaps that happens when you are sitting in church, when you are praying, when you are reading your Bible or when you are having a conversation with one of your friends.

The world we live in is full of distractions, lots of things are trying to get our attention all the time: the adverts are louder and more personalised than ever, the screens are bigger, the clothes more shiny, the shops more tempting. How easy is it for you to get distracted from caring for others, from trying to do the right thing, from loving God and our neighbours?

Jesus talks about the way that the things of this world (riches, fancy clothes, a nice car, expensive toys, getting more money, being better off than those around us) how all of those things become a barrier to getting to know him. How, if we truly want to follow Jesus, we have to turn away from the distractions of this world in order to focus on the love of God, a love that lasts forever.

This week, as we go about our daily lives, can we be aware of how easy it is to get distracted like the dogs in Up. Let's make sure we are committed to following Jesus as best we can, and try not to shout 'squirrel' too many times!³

Reflections on the reading

[Two people are ready to read the Bible – one at a lectern or desk, one in the pulpit, if possible. The text is written for A being a woman, but this could easily be adapted. Both are ready to read. They look at each other – puzzled and begin to read at the same time.]

- A Psalm 22.
- B Psalm 121.
- A Excuse me! I thought you asked me to read Psalm 22?
- B I did. But I thought you weren't going to start, so I thought I should.
- A But you're not reading the same psalm.
- B No. I'm reading Psalm 121.
- A So you don't want me to read Psalm 22?
- B Yes I do. And I also want to read number 121.
- A Two Psalms? Are you sure?
- B Absolutely!
- A Sounds strange to me. Anyway, who goes first? I suppose it should be you, that seems polite.
- B Oh, no! Surely it should be ladies first?
- A Maybe! But in the opinion of some of those people out there, I'm no lady!
- B And we're wasting time! How are we going to resolve this?
- A I know! Let's be different. Let's read alternate verses. You start!
- B Psalm 121
- A Psalm 22
- B 'I lift up my eyes to the hills where has my help come from?'
- A 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, from the words of my groaning?'
- B 'My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth.'
- A 'O my God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night and am not silent.'
- B 'He will not let your foot slip he who watches over you will not slumber.'
- A Excuse me a minute!
- B Yes! What now?
- A Are we reading from the same book?
- B I hope so! Mine's a bible and it looks like yours is too.
- A Well I think there's some kind of discrepancy.
- B Do you indeed? What is it now?
- A Well, whoever wrote my psalm couldn't seem to find God anywhere. Your man knows exactly where to find him. So my man goes round shouting, 'Where are you, God? I want to talk to you!' while yours just ambles off to the hillside to find him.
- B So obviously your writer was going through a bad patch and mine was happy and contented.
- A Good for him! But mine was really feeling totally lost and in despair and just finding someone else who was on top of the world wouldn't have exactly filled his life with joy, would it? You need more than that when you think your world's coming to an end.
- B Yes. Agreed. But they were probably two very different people.
- A That's a blindingly obvious statement!
- B And we all go through different phases of life at different times.
- A I think I knew that too!
- B So sometimes you feel far away from God and sometimes you feel close.
- A And sometimes I wish you'd stop talking in clichès and give me a sensible answer.

- B Well, when you read through the Psalms it means you can always find one that will speak to the way you feel.
- A But which of them do I believe? One of them feels forgotten by God and the other one feels totally protected and supported. All these contradictions! I give up! I'm going and I just hope that somebody will be able to explain it all!
- B Perhaps that is what church is for to help address these kind of issues.4

What we hope is that with your help, as a congregation, we can wrestle with and discuss one of the issues at stake in this reading, the apparent presence of contradictions in the Bible.

So, let's spend a few minutes talking to the people around us about this:

- Do you think there are contradictions in the Bible?
- Why might they be there?
- How do we use any apparent contradictions to help us further our understanding of God and how we should live?

[Hold a conversation about this issue, you may like to think of other questions to ask or make the questions listed above available on a screen or printed paper to help people have the discussion. Depending on time and the size of congregation, it may be helpful to spend a few minutes hearing people's reflections and thoughts.]

Let us remember those who are actively dealing with conflict or the effects of prolonged war. Those who have been separated from their families because of the pandemic. Those who are uncertain about their employment. Those who sit waiting for results. In this moment of silence, let us share these concerns and those we bring with us today with God.
