STORY 'Stone Soup'

The story is told of three travellers who arrived in a village one evening tired and hungry. The villagers saw them coming and locked their doors and hid their food.

The travellers knocked on the door of the first cottage. A man peeked out of a crack in the door and said: 'We do not have enough food for ourselves and we have given our beds to travellers who arrived before you.' Every house they visited had a similar story. No-one had any food to share and they offered good reasons. The grain they did have was to be used for seed. The sick and the elderly of the village need their help. A father spoke of feeding his many children.

One of the travellers called out: 'Good people, we are three hungry travellers in a strange land. We have asked you for food and you have no food. We will have to make stone soup!'

The villagers were quite intrigued and gathered around the travellers. They asked for wood to build a fire, a large pot and some water. The strangers dropped three smooth round stones into the pot. They asked for some salt and pepper to season the soup. Some children ran to fetch the seasonings.

A single Ukrainian lady, currently living in Walsall with her Swiss White Shepherd dog, is seeking accommodation in Wolverhampton where she is studying at Wolverhampton College.

Maryna is 57 years old, a lawyer by profession, and has an excellent command of English. She has been with her hosting family for five months now, and has just one month to find alternative accommodation. Her current sponsors wish to disengage from the scheme for the time being.

I have seen several pictures of her dog, who is particularly friendly towards cats, having lived with three felines in Kiiv! My research on the breed's temperament tells me that they are very intelligent, loyal, are 56-66 cm tall (weight 22-44 kg) and are good with children. They need plenty of walks.

She is hoping that an older couple or single person would be willing to host her and her pet dog, ideally in a house with a garden.
